SITES & SIGHTS


Taking in the sunset from the back side of the Lincoln Memorial is a special, semi-secret treat. The Martin Luther King, Jr Memorial is also spectacular night or day.

Late night reflections on the Mall are worth your time. The Korean War (especially the way the holograms pop), Vietnam War, and Lincoln Memorials are respectfully amazing at night.

Learn something new at any museum in the Smithsonian system—Natural History is a perennial favorite.

The Phillips Collection is one fabulous, small, non-crowded art museum with some of the most incredible pieces of artwork. And the Postal Service Museum is a fun, funky, and FREE little out-ofthe-way learning experience if you want something different!

A little off the beaten path, Hillwood Estates, the former estate of Marjorie Post, is worth a visit.

For DC's best coffee, head to 14th street and check out Slipstream, Wydown, and Peregrine Espresso.

Snag the best breakfast and chai tea in DC at Teaism—any of their multiple locations.

Grab a slice at the best Neopolitan pizza restaurant in the known universe, 2 Amys!

To satisfy your pastry craving, Dangerous Pies DC has sweet and savory pies TO DIE FOR.

Not only will the Korean tacos blow your mind, you can also pick up some artisanal pickles or delicacy chocolates for the road at Union Market in the NoMa neigborhood.

Pick anywhere in Barrack's Row and go there to eat or drink, or both! That will also put you in close proximity to Eastern Market.

OUT & ABOUT

Take a moment to yourself during the meeting: leave the Gaylord and take the trails to the pedestrian bridge, which allows you to walk over the Woodrow Wilson Bridge. It's a nice walk in the evenings—especially as the sun sets.

Immerse yourself in the deep historical significance of the Shaw neighborhood. The U Street corridor (roughly between 9тн and 18тн) in particular

is a must-visit for music fans, Duke Ellington enthusiasts, and Ben's Chili Bowl half-smoke lovers.

Hike through Rock Creek Park and follow it with a stop at a nearby watering hole. Pretty much any al fresco dining in the city is a good choice.

Go for a run between the Capitol and the Washington Monument on the Mall. It's a great way to see the area!


Take a water taxi from National Harbor to the stadium in Navy Yard and catch a Washington Nationals game on the weekend after the meeting.

For a nice view of the city, some wonderful old trees, and guiet contemplation, visit Arlington National Cemetary. If you have small children, visit the park at the north end of the runway from Reagan National Airport. You feel like you can practically reach up and touch the planes as they come and go.

Take a trolley tour of Old Town Alexandria—it's just as beautiful as Georgetown but not as well known. Visit one of the oldest Baptist churches in the area: Alfred Street Baptist Church.







National Harbor

Getting Around

National Harbor's resort atmosphere is made possible by its distance from the heart of DC—but that doesn't mean you can't get there if you want to!



Public Transportation Bus/ Train System

The Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) serves National Harbor via bus lines NH1 and NH3. The daily NH1 bus will take you to and from the Branch Ave train stop, on the green line, and from there you can access the entire metro train system. Late-night and early-morning NH3 buses will take you to and from the Southern Ave train stop, which is also on the greenline. Plan your trip at www.wmata.com.

Water Taxi

Go maritime and catch a water taxi down the Potomac from National Harbor to the National Mall. The taxi also stops in Old Town Alexandria. One-way tickets for adults are \$16; round trip are \$28. Check the schedule and route at potomacriverboatco.com/newnational-harbor-taxi.php.

National Harbor Shuttle

National Harbor offers a courtesy shuttle service (max of 51 passengers) between National Harbor and the King Street train stop in Alexandria, which is on the blue and orange WMATA metro train lines. From there, you can access the entire metro train system. See the courtesy shuttle schedule at

Taxi or Uber

There's also the good, old-fashioned taxi. A drive into the heart of downtown DC will take 15-20 minutes. Check with the Gaylord concierge for recommended companies.
