NEW ACNM CAUCUS OFFERS OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENT MIDWIVES INTERESTED IN PUBLIC HEALTH

In the early 20th century, nurse-midwives joined the ranks of public health nurses in the United States to address the nation's increasing maternal and infant mortality rates. From the early days of Mary Breckenridge and her Frontier Nursing Service, nurse-midwives have cared for underserved women in both rural and urban settings. Today, many CNMs/CMs come to the profession with a Master's in Public Health, and Johns Hopkins School of Nursing offers a combined public health nursing/nurse-midwifery degree in collaboration with Shenandoah University. Despite a history steeped in the public health tradition, until recently ACNM did not offer an official venue for public-health oriented midwives to connect.

That changed in May, 2016, when a conversation between myself and a member of our Maryland affiliate, Jeanne Murphy, CNM, resulted in a call for the founding of a new Public Health caucus at the National Meeting. Twenty-five CNMs and student nurse-midwives from across the country met to discuss our passion for public health and our vision for the new caucus, which includes advocacy and education surrounding such varied topics as maternal HIV/AIDS, opioid use disorder, and access to healthcare for all.

I was a student at the time the caucus was founded, and the Standard Rules and Operating Procedures are designed to encourage student involvement. There is a student position built into the leadership structure, and a goal of the caucus is to create mentorship opportunities between students and experienced midwives with similar interests. Membership is open to all ACNM members, and our next meeting will be held at the National Meeting this coming May in Chicago. For more information or to get involved, e-mail me at sestes15@su.edu. PREPARATIONS FOR THE 2017 SANMS STUDENT REPORT

Every year the Student Liaisons to the Student and New Midwives Section write a report to present to the membership. This report is addressed by the Board of Directors and the National Office Staff. The SANMS Student Liaisons are busy working on gathering information for the 2017 Student Report. WHAT DOES THE ACNM STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE DO?

I often get asked what my responsibilities are as the Student Representative on the ACNM Board of Directors. As the Student Representative, I serve a one-year term on the ACNM Board of Directors. This term ends for me at the Annual Meeting in May of this year. The Student Representative role rotates through the Midwifery Education Programs alphabetically. Dede Horvath, a student at Emory at the time she served, preceded me, a Frontier Student, and I will be succeeded by a student from Georgetown. My primary role on the Board is to provide a student voice at the table during Board discussions. I represent all students, not just the ones from my school. Though the Student Representative does not have a vote in board decisions, the Student Representative is free to voice opinions, and is often asked for their opinion.

In addition to attending board meetings, I have other responsibilities, as do the other Board Members. I liaison with the program committee, SANMS section of the Division of Education, and I serve on the Peer Review and Volunteer Structure Realignment Taskforces. This often involves monthly conference calls for each of the duties and frequent email discussions in between. I also work with Lisa Paine of the A.C.N.M Foundation to create a student-driven initiative for the ACNM Foundation. Furthermore, I serve as a point of contact for students and potential students for a variety of issues and questions. This role is a unique and eye opening experience. ACNM is a complex organization, and this experience has helped me develop a deeper understanding of the organization. I feel very prepared to continue with this organization as a future leader.
