Pre-Interview Preparation and Equipment

Once an interviewee and date of interview have been established, the interviewer will:

- Contact interviewee by phone or email. Send the interviewee the "Guidelines for Your Interview". If interviewee does not have a curriculum vitae or has not completed a "Biographical Data Form", consider completing that with them over the phone. Several days before interview, reconnect by phone and ask if interviewee has any questions on information to be covered.
- Confirm time and date of interview and amount of total time interview will take.
- 3. Inform interviewee of space needed for interview, to include:
 - a. Number of persons who will be at interview and number or seats needed.
 - b. Amount/quality of light and availability of electrical outlets for equipment if the interview is to be videotaped.
 - c. Discuss the importance of limiting external noise or any other distractions, including phones and pets.
- 4. Suggest interviewee select a comfortable chair with good light for interview. Interviewee may also want to collect some of their personal memorabilia that can be photographed at the time of the interview along with the interviewee.

Prior to the interview, the interviewer should collect the following:

- 1. Use "Guidelines for Your Interview" to organize the interview and review standard "Interview Introduction".
- 2. Review the interviewee's CV or biographical data form prior to the interview.
- 3. Collect all necessary forms and complete whatever possible prior to interview:
 - a. Biographical Data Form or Curriculum Vitae
 - b. Interview Release Forms
 - c. Extra pens/pencils and paper
- 4. If you are videotaping or audio recording the interview inspect equipment and practice operating:
 - a. Charge camera battery and bring additional battery with charger and cord
 - b. Practice turning on/off camera or recording device, setting recording distance and using tripod
 - c. Bring headset and extra memory cards
 - d. Bring Camcorder Operating Manual, for reference as needed
 - e. Bring 12-ft electrical extension cord
 - f. Practice taking still photos in case there are photos to be recorded.

Guidelines for Your Interview

Thank you for volunteering to be interviewed for the Interview History Project. We want you to feel free to discuss whatever you decide is important. It is not necessary to answer all these questions. We are not looking for a summary of your entire career, but want to know the way it was/is at your particular time and place in history.

To start we will ask you some biographical information:

- Date and place of birth
- Date and place of basic nursing or other college education
- Date and place of your midwifery education and any other degrees you may hold

Next we will ask about what drew you to midwifery:

- When did you decide to go to school and what drew you to that particular educational institution?
- Was there a particular individual who influenced your decisions?
- Describe the attitude of your friends or family about your decision?

Next we will ask about your midwifery experience which may include:

- · Where you first worked.
- How you were accepted within the healthcare system.
- What effect (if any) did the medical practice model have on your practice?
- Were there any regulation issues (from institutions or government) which affected your practice?
- Were there reimbursement issues which affected your practice?

In addition, you may want to:

- Describe a challenging or memorable experience that may have triggered joy, sadness, fear, or anger.
- Are there any other events or experiences you'd like to mention?
- Describe any events that happened that you would consider important to the history of midwifery.

Lastly, if you have retired, we will ask about your life after you stopped clinical practice:

- Describe your feelings. Did you have any adjustments to make and if so what?
- Do you remain engaged in the midwifery community either through ACNM or socially?
- What would help maintain your connection with ACNM?

You are welcome to have notes with you during the interview to which you can refer.

If you have pictures you would like to have included in the videotaping, please bring them with you.
